
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to draw the largest crowds of students, alumni and community such that attendance at this event surpasses homecoming and graduation.


Kickin' up Spirit. Cheerleaders spirit soar and their legs follow as they perform a rigorous cheer.

Grimsley Senior High School has experienced another excellent start to the school year. The Whirlies continue to gain national recognition for outstanding academics and service to our community. These recognitions are not possible without the support of the best Alumni Association in the country! Our current faculty and students are grateful for your contributions to our school! Please enjoy the good news items and updates below.

Grimsley Senior High to Celebrate its 20th International Baccalaureate Graduating Class

Grimsley High School is one of four International Baccalaureate high schools in Guilford County and one of sixty-two in North Carolina. When it was founded in 1995, we were the first IB Programme in Guilford County and one of only four programs in the state. We are in our twenty-first year of offering the IB Programme.

Since its inception, the Grimsley IB Programme has graduated 492 IB Diploma graduates. Forty-nine students earned an IB diploma in 2016, and former IB students are currently enrolled in various Ivy League, private, and state universities across the United States. Many of our graduates choose to study abroad during their collegiate experience.

Grimsley Senior High Receives National Recognition

Grimsley High School is often listed as one of Newsweek's Top High Schools. This includes being named to the "Beating the Odds" list of the nation's top high schools this year. That list identifies schools that do an excellent job of preparing students for college while also serving a high percentage of students who live in poverty, accounting for the fact that socioeconomic status is closely correlated with academic achievement across the nation.

Darryl Brown Rebuilds Whirlie Football Program

If you've had the opportunity to attend a Grimsley football game this Fall, you can see the impact that our new Head Football Coach Darryl Brown and his coaching staff have made on the team. The Varsity program has competed hard in every game and already has matched the total number of

wins from the previous season. The JV team is off to a 4-1 start, which is very promising as this group moves to the Varsity level next year.

The following is an excerpt from the News and Record, highlighting our new coach's accomplishments:

The whirlies get a coach whose Southern teams compiled a record of 94-44 overall and 45-13 in 11 seasons. The Storm won four conference championships and reached the NCHSAA playoffs every year, advancing to the quarterfinals three of the last four seasons. Brown has been named his conference's coach of the year four times, and he was a North Carolina assistant coach at the 2013 Shrine Bowl of the Carolinas.

"Coach Brown is a successful coach and teacher from Southern High School, where he and his staff have demonstrated the ability to teach and coach young men

for many years," Grimsley athletics director Lewis
Newman said in a news
release. "Coach Brown
will immediately begin to
impact our Whirlies with his
weightlifting program, and
the coordination of hiring
his staff."



I retired at the end of the school year 2001, ending a 32.5 year career. Retirement was NOT easy for me. I remember being very sad the day the teachers went back to work in August 2001. I also got a bit depressed. You see, teaching really defined me in my professional

career. I LOVED it. After formal retirement, I subbed for certain teachers until December, 2015. Then I decided that enough was enough. 45 years in education was it for me! Now I love retirement! I have 7 grandchildren that make life so wonderful! I have my health and my sense of humor is still in tact. What am I doing? Whatever I please, whenever I please. Was it all worth it? You bet your boots it was!!!

What is your favorite memory of Grimsley, (activity or teaching moment)?


In Memoriam

This is a one on one mentoring experience that occurs one day a week during the Grimsley student's lunch. The buddies do a variety of things together including: reading, recess, lunch and some tutoring. In my time as faculty sponsor, I have heard of many instances where a Whirlie has had a profound positive impact on a young person at Brooks. These stories make me proud to be associated with the Brooks Buddies Club.

The club is run by the students in terms of screening applicants, organizing the first few trips over, and communicating between the buddies and the Brooks staff. This year's co-presidents are Mackenzie Phillips and Nina Dakoriya who have both been with the club since their freshmen year. Below is some of their insights/reflections.

Brooks Buddies is a great club where Grimsley students go to Brooks Elementary once a week during their lunch to connect and spend time with a student at Brooks. Students are also able to gain service learning hours. MACKENZIE PHILLIPS: "Throughout the school year students of all grades are able to take a short walk over to Brooks Global Elementary to get a service opportunity like no other. It really is a highlight of many of the buddies' weeks, and is a great opportunity to have a connection between the two schools as well."

NINA DAKORIYA: "You think you are missing lunch with your friends, but really you are forming a great bond with a child who really looks forward to seeing and spending time with you. Seeing the smile on their faces when you walk is a great pleasure that makes it all worth it!"

(Please note: the following is not an exhaustive list of items we would like to have.) If you have items you would like to donate, please contact me so we can make arrangements. HOME MOVIES: One thing in particular we have long hoped to obtain are **copies of home movies of GHS events**, in particular of May Day ceremonies (held each year at GHS from 1939 until 1972). We feel sure that other GHS events over the years were filmed by parents or students, for posterity; we'd like to add copies to the school collection as well (and possibly put them online for all to enjoy)!

EARLY-YEARS' DIPLOMAS, CLASS RINGS

PROGRAMS: printed programs from graduations, baccalaureate services, concerts, plays, May Day, Homecoming, Torchlight inductions and other groups' ceremonies, athletic events (including football and basketball programs), awards ceremonies, building dedications, etc. Also, invitations to graduations and other school events.

PHOTOGRAPHS: photos of people and events connected to GHS, either on-campus or away. (A key should be provided, mentioning date, names and class years, and other pertinent details of the photograph; care should be taken if writing on the

back of a photograph.)

"SPIRIT ITEMS": buttons, ribbons, pins, pennants, a letter jacket or sweater, mugs, license plates, and who-knows-what?

RECORDINGS: pre-1960 records and tapes of the band, orchestra, and choir (please note: phonograph records require special handling for shipping)

SCRAPBOOKS: not only personal scrapbooks, but also scrapbooks for clubs and other school organizations you were a part of **REFLECTORS:** the school yearbook from 1909 to 1930, we are always looking for copies of **Reflectors** to add to our collection **HOME SPUNS:** the school literary magazine from the 1920's to the 1960's, we are missing issues from many years of this former publication

HIGH LIFES: we especially need copies of many issues of the school newspaper from the late 1930's through the early 1950's. Several of the school years in this period--the late 30's and several years in the 40's--we have no copies of *High Life* at all. (Some later years are also needed; please feel free to ask if you have some to donate.)

WHIRLIGIGS: while we have copies of every issue of our yearbook first published in 1950, we do need some better-condition copies of some of the books in the 50's, especially 1957, and we're always on the lookout for copies of the 1952 and 1958 *Whirligigs* as well.
